A Message from Dalay

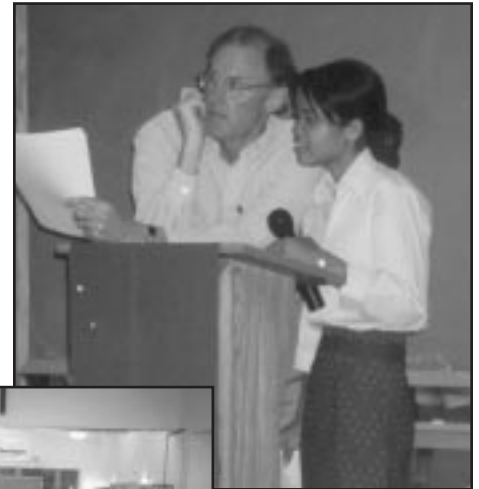


Remember Cambodia? It is a small Southeast Asian nation that shares borders with Thailand, Laos and Vietnam. On the southwest is the country's only exit to the sea, a short stretch of coastline on the Gulf of Thailand.

The land is about 182, 000 square kilometers and has a population of over 12 million, making it about 2 times smaller than Colorado in land area, but almost 3 times greater in population.

Cambodia was one of the most powerful kingdoms since the 1st century. Its grandeur was evident by building of the magnificent Angkor Wat, an architectural wonder. In the early 20th century, Cambodia was known to be the most advanced and developed country in Southeast Asia. However, in the last century, Cambodia was hit by several wars one after the other and finally leading up to the notorious "Killing Fields" - the worst bloodshed in our modern history. During the 4 years (1975-1979) under the Pol Pot regime, basic infrastructure, production systems, social services and even community and family ties were severely disrupted. The outcome of this trauma is reflected in the 1997 Human Development Index, ranking Cambodia 153rd out of 175 nations in the world. The Khmer Rouge was finally expelled with the aid of the Vietnamese, however Vietnamese occupation of Cambodia did not signal the beginning of

peace. For about 10 years, Cambodia continued to face much unrest as different political parties, supported by external forces, clamor for power. Even after the UN assisted national elections in 1993, internal fighting continued, the last of which was the July 1997 coup. Since then, the fighting



seemed to have sputtered out over the last few years. There had not been any major bloodshed in the last 2 years and we pray, never ever again. Many people are beginning to see glimmers of hope as the nation is being rebuilt. *Continued on Page 3*

Pastor's notes

I have come upon two phrases recently which I will be using from time to time, beginning... now! The first one is, "I am 56 years old. I don't have time to play church." If it's not authentic, I don't want to do it. Esther is a little younger than I am (believe it or not), but she doesn't have time to play church either. If it's not authentic, she doesn't want to do it. Equally important, regardless of your age, you don't have time to play church. If it's not authentic, I hope you won't want to do it.

The second phrase is, "I am here to talk with you about life." About the fullness of life. About abundant life. About authentic life. About growing toward full humanity as we see it in Jesus Christ, as we say with each baptism.

How do we not "play church"? How do we grow toward full humanity? What does that have to do with our strategic plan? As Esther and I worked on a draft to present to the Strategic Plan committee, as we listened to our own stories, and tried to uncover the foundational level of what church should be about, three themes emerged. To be authentic, we must be Invitational, Relational and Missional. These are not separate dimensions, but each is fully a part of the others.

Pastor's Notes

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Invitational. "I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly." (John 10:10). There are two parts to the invitation. One is, whoever you are, wherever you are in your life, there is a place for you here. The second is an invitation to growth, to engage the risk and promise of life, and a deep faith that embraces life in all its joys and difficulties. It is an invitation to continue to push our limits and challenge our boundaries—what we experience, and who we are.

Relational. "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength... and you shall love your neighbor as yourself." (Mark 12:30-31) We are made by God, at the most basic level, for relationship—with God, with others and with ourselves. This relational life animates everything else. Central to living out our commitment to relational life in the context of church is ministry through "Small Groups" (for lack of a better term). Education, support, mission, service, recreation or administration, any time we gather to do the work of the church, whatever it is, we hope we will engage in "Small Group" ministry. "Small Group," then, is a metaphor for people gathered to share gifts, passion, vision, and life. This is a way of connecting our life together as a community of faith. In our deepening relation to one another is an expression of our growing relation to God. Our growing relation to God is lived out through deepening connections with one another: our "neighbors," next to us, across town and around the world.

Missional. "What does the Lord require of you but to do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with your God?" (Micah 6:8). This text from Micah, which we sing every Sunday, means a commitment to all people. There is no division between "us" and "them." There is only "us." It means a belief that giving back to life, working together for something greater than ourselves. It means part of growing toward full humanity as we see it in Jesus Christ is helping to build a world in which all people are valued and can share in the fullness of life.

What is the most effective, efficient way to live this together? What changes need to be made? How do we nurture accountability, diversity, flexibility and creativity in our ministries? How do we help people identify, develop and express their gifts for ministry? How do we prioritize our resources? Responses to these and other questions will be explored by the Strategic Planning Committee, the Administrative Council, and through open "focus groups" with all of St. Luke's.

Here are six needs for St. Luke's future.

- **We need a clear vision.** The Strategic Planning Committee will be proposing a vision statement to the Administrative Council for approval. As always, that meeting will be open to anyone who wants to participate.
- **We need a passion for that vision.** If the vision doesn't express the passion of our people, then the rest of the Plan won't work. It must engage and call us to be God's people in the world.
- **We need to reorganize so that ministry teams, composed of staff and congregation, have the freedom, flexibility and responsibility to do their ministry.** This includes eliminating as many meetings as possible, to free time and energy for ministry. Communication, frequent and easily accessible, becomes increasingly important.
- **We need to engage all our church community, at whatever point(s) fit for them.**
- **We need multiple, diverse ways to help people "find their gifts and give them away."**
 - **We need a process for leadership development.**

The issue is not that none of this is being done now. Rather, it is how we can more clearly, coherently, and comprehensively work together to be who God is calling us to be at this time and place. Your input is important. There will be regular updates on "The Plan," and we invite your conversation.

The "Lay" test News: Means of Grace II

Grace – The favor and love of God; influence of God operating in man to improve and strengthen.

When I decided to split my column last month and write about community of faith, fasting, and acts of mercy this month, I did not expect to have the prism of a difficult life experience to look at them through. My serious head injury and my time spent convalescing gave me a chance to think about these aspects of grace.

First of all, it reminded me how important the St. Luke's community of faith is to me. When I was hurt, it was your prayers that lifted up me and my needs. As I healed, it was your words and touch that provided God's comfort to me. A community of faith is a means of grace because God works through that community to care for its members. It is important to remember that being a member of a community of faith is not just for the faithful, but it is also a means of grace for the struggling. The German theologian Detrich Bonhoeffer said, "Even though as Christians we all profess to be sinners, we are surprised to find a sinner among us." Remember that St. Luke's is here for you just as much when you are struggling with Christian discipleship as when you are faithful. Turn towards the community of faith when you are struggling, not away.

I have always had trouble visualizing fasting as a means of grace. I think that it is because when Methodism meets food, the result is usually a potluck. As I lay in the hospital bed, fasting seemed easy. My taste buds didn't work, my head hurt and it hurt even more when I chewed. As I lay there, I realized that if I wanted to get better, I had to eat and that eating was an act of determination that stated that I wanted to get better. So I ate. I realized that fasting could also be an act of determination, a statement to ourselves and to God that we are willing to put God above our own comfort or wants. The next time that I need to make that statement, I know how to do it.

If I had to state how my faith has changed as I have matured, I would highlight two things. First, it gives me a feeling of being connected to all people as God's children and all things as God's creation. Second, it gives me a feeling of gratitude because I realize that no matter how hard I work for some things, many other more important things have been given to me simply because I am a child of God. I think that the means of grace that helps me best understand these points is acts of mercy. Being of service to others for no other reason than I am called to it by my faith reminds me that I am connected to other people no matter who they are or where they are. Being able to share what I have reminds me to be grateful for all I have been given, including the precious gift of life.

Grace is abundant and so are the means of grace. The next time you are struggling or hurting, consider how you can invite God's love into your life to strengthen and improve your faith.
