loved our children, developed creative programs such as Friday Kids' Night Out, and worked hard to see that they had a Christian educational experience at St. Luke's. What was for many years a part-time position, has evolved into a "time-and- a-half" position. As her life takes her in new directions, we want to thank Gwyn for her gifts to our children and to St. Luke's.

A Vision for St. Luke's: Core Values

Someone said, "I don't believe in organized religion." I said, "Great! You'll really love St. Luke's." That's a joke. The basic question that confronts each of us personally, professionally, and as a church is first: Not how to get organized, but why? What is our purpose? So that... what? Then, how can we organize to fulfill that purpose, in a way that the organization doesn't become its own reason for being.

That is our hope with the strategic plan. "To design the most efficient, effective, organic structure to fulfill our call to grow together toward full humanity as we see it in Jesus Christ."

How do we not just maintain, or even just improve who we are now, as wonderful as that is, but embrace a VISION large enough for our present and future? In the context of one of the fastest growing areas in the country? To answer that, the Strategic Planning Team first asked, "What are our core values?"

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Here's where we came out: To do church authentically, we must be Invitational, Relational and Missional.

These are not separate values, but each one is fully and simultaneously a part of the others.

- 1. Invitational. "I have come that they might have life and have it abundantly," Jesus said. Whoever you are, wherever you are in your life, there is a place for you here. Regardless. We meet each person where they are. We are here for searchers as well as established Christians. But we don't want to stop there. The invitation is also to grow in our faith to be challenged, deepened, to engage the threat and promise of a full life, abundant life.
- **2. Relational.** "Love the Lord your God with all your heart, mind, soul and strength, and your neighbor as yourself." Mark 12:30-31. We are made by God at the deepest level for relationship with God, with ourselves, and with others. Those relationships animate everything else.
- **3. Missional.** "What does the Lord require of you but to do justice, love kindness and walk humbly with your God?" We sing that every Sunday. It means more than simply giving away a turkey for Thanksgiving. There are how many children living under the poverty level? What does that have to do with us? Look at who is on death row. What does that have to do with us? We are all part of God's family. There is no "us" and "them." Just us.

After the sermon on change, Dean Luallen asked me, "What kind of changes are you talking about? Are we going to have animal sacrifices or something?" No. And no human sacrifices, I hope.

Some of the changes will have to do with how we think about who we are. If we really expect to have guests, to invite guests, then we can't give out our bread the same way. Besides it being more hospitable to have a conversation with someone on the way to get the bread, we wouldn't have time to introduce everyone. I will miss that too. That's something we can do with 5 or 6, but not 10 or 12. What do we expect? What do we plan for? What does that tell us about how we understand who we are, our purpose? Who is God calling us to be here?

How do we answer that? One way is to think Invitational, Relational and Missional in everything we do. Another is that we organize around Ministry Teams. How is that different from now? Well, here's an analogy that breaks down quickly, but think of the difference between the Johnny Carson Show, and Latenight with David Letterman. On Johnny Carson, those with "talents" or gifts were limited to Johnny, Ed and a guest. With Letterman, there is the camera person, director, band, people in the studio, people on the street. All together.

There are differences between Letterman and Ministry Teams, of course! Ministry Teams covenant intentionally and passionately to be Invitational, Relational and Missional in whatever their ministry is: stuffing bulletins, working with children and youth, supporting special needs, serving food, caring for seniors, playing softball, finance, trustees, going to Cambodia, whatever. One key is how do we help you find YOUR gift, and give it away?

This has to do, really, with listening carefully for who God is calling us to be, and more clearly defining who we are. Our vision for this church. With each of us really believing that is who we are. And with organizing so that together we can express that with one another, and with our neighbors—next to us, across town, and around the world.

What will this all look like? Some of it we can tell you. Some we can't. Not because it is a secret, but because it will evolve as we work together. We encourage you to read the plan when it gets on our web site, or pick up a copy in the office. Though the plan is always "in process," it will have more details about the structure and implications. And we encourage you to attend one of the focus groups (see Page 1 for schedule), both for information and because your views and very important. The future of St. Luke's. You are part of it.

Baptism is an act of Grace, but also a celebration of the presence of Grace in your life, past, present, and future.

As with other community moments at St Luke's, we want baptism to be more than a ritual; we want it to be a starting point in your spiritual journey. We feel that the way to do this is to have a short one-hour class on baptism beforehand. It will be a brief explanation of the meaning of baptism in the Christian church and the United Methodist Church. Please join us.


