On August 12th, 2000, St. Luke's truly was able to experience a little of Cambodian culture. Approximately 150 members and friends attended the "Taste of Cambodia." Those who attended were able to start their bidding at the Silent Auction at 4 p.m. sharp. There were 257 individual items to choose from. Items ranged from the popular Beanie Babies to a weeks vacation in beautiful Silverthorne. St. Luke's members and friends, and many local businesses donated all of the items. Jan Stull worked many hard hours, with her committee in organizing the entire Silent Auction. A special thank you goes to all that were so generous!



At 5:30, a delicious Cambodian style dinner was served. The menu consisted of BBQ Beef, Curry Soup, Cambodian Pork Egg Rolls, Cambodian Salad, Sticky Noodles, and our very own Dalay Dy's favorite dessert, Coconut Gelatin. Which, by the way, she prepared special for the "Taste." All of the food was kept warm and ready to serve in our very own Food Warmer donated by Dan Washburn of Fazoli's. But, there is more to the story than just food. St. Luke's was blessed in many ways that night. 11 Cambodian women who spent the entire day cooking and preparing all the food. These special women came from Khmer Christian Reform Church in Aurora. They were contacted about one month ago, we had requested one or two women who might be able to assist in helping us prepare the food. A week later we received a phone call from Pastor Kim, of the Khmer Church, stating they would love to be a part of our Taste of Cambodia and would send a group of women to do all the cooking. Their generosity didn't end there.

At approximately 6:30, everyone was invited into the sanctuary to enjoy an incredible hour of entertainment "donated" by the Cambodian Fine Arts Council. Mr. Sorn Chin was the guest speaker for the entire presentation. He gave us a brief history of Cambodia's war filled past. The evening was filled with authentic Cambodian music. Three gentlemen played traditional folk songs and also shared their traditional instruments in solo pieces. The wonderful "Wishing Dance" and more was performed by the children with their bright smiles in their beautiful costumes. Then, everyone watched a fashion show displaying a traditional wedding party. A special thank you goes to our Ken Fong and Jim Ramsey who worked so hard to make everything just right for all the entertainers. The tastes, sights and sounds of this evening will be treasured by all.

Change is a part of life. That is no surprise, but it is important to remember. Here are some changes for us.

Lynda Fickling. After three-and-a-half years as our Director of Membership and Outreach, Lynda has decided to leave that position. With her care, over five hundred people have joined St. Luke's, many more have been helped to find their places here, and have been ministered to in a variety of ways. She is now on the other side of the phone, awaiting an invitation to participate in St. Luke's in a new way! Lynda, you are the best, and you have both my gratitude and best wishes.

Strategic Plan. Our "in-progress" document outlining a strategic plan for the next three years will soon be on our web site for your reflection and feedback. In addition, during October, we will have a number of focus groups for discussion of the plan. This plan is not a blueprint for every board and nail, but a vision for our identity, structure and process to help us grow "toward full humanity as we see it in Jesus Christ" (from our vision statement).

Some parts are being implemented now, such as the development of Ministry Teams, and activities like "Goofing off with the ministers." However, any structural changes must be approved by our Church Conference in January.

Baptism. Beginning in October, we will have a designated time to meet with parents who wish to have an infant or child baptized. This will enable us to meet as a group to become acquainted and discuss the meaning and process of baptism. Look for dates in the announcements and web site.

New Member Orientation. Also beginning in October, NMO will be transformed from a two-week experience to a four-week experience. An optional "Starting Point" will be held to provide information and a connection for our guests. "Next Step" will be the four-week membership course.

Change may be welcomed, unwelcomed; comfortable, uncomfortable; easy, difficult; embraced, fought; or anywhere along those continuums. I hope, whatever the changes are like for you, that we will work with them together. That is one way we try to be an authentic church of Jesus Christ.

Lay Leader

St. Luke's is lucky to have two Lay Leaders serving our congregation. As liaisons between the members of the congregation (laity) and the ministers, these people are wonderful assets and resources for all of us. In this edition of *The Chronicle* we will get to know Monty Hoffman a little better. In our next issue we'll talk to Heather Harding, our other Lay Leader.

Monty was born in Nebraska and spent his first 11 years growing up in Valentine. His family then moved to Showlow, AZ. The town's name comes from its history—it was won in a card game. Monty stayed in Arizona for his undergraduate degree in Geology from Northern Arizona University. He then earned a Master's degree in Geology from the University of Wyoming. In 1977 he moved to Denver to work for an oil company, and has been here most of the time since then.

Monty and his wife, Raina, have three children: Erin, Logan, and Brynn. Monty's hobbies include many outdoor activities such as fishing, hiking, backpacking, skiing, and biking. Rollerblading has moved down his list of favorite activities since a skull fracture earlier this summer. Now the proud owner of a "really good helmet," Monty is glad to be on the road to a full recovery.

Monty joined St. Luke's in 1987, when the congregation boasted a total of 70 members. A lifelong Methodist, he found the church regaining importance in his life as he raised his family. In 1997, Dick Evans asked Monty to serve as a Lay Leader. Monty recognized that we have "two very talented ministers who work very hard," and he was happy to do what he could to assist them in serving our congregation (now over 1150 members.) He sees the Lay Leader serving both a structured role and a spiritual role. In the formal role, he enjoys participating in baptisms and seeing the church's newest members. In the spiritual role, Monty writes a column in *The Chronicle* and occasionally preaches on Laity Sundays. He is also interested in the future of the church, particularly the development of small groups.

Monty would like the congregation to know that he is available as a resource in several ways. As a liaison with the ministers, Monty may be a more comfortable person for some people to contact with questions or concerns. He is also willing to discuss issues of faith and spiritual learning with members of the congregation.



Q: What's new, different, the same, in adult education at St. Luke's this fall?

Phase III Financial Update

Congratulations and thanks to all who participated in the Phase III construction project. The Phase III project was formally closed out when we converted from construction to permanent mortgage financing as of July 30, 2000. Special thanks to Keybank for their support of St. Luke's with a very flexible and competitive financial package taking us through construction and beyond. Our new monthly mortgage payment on our \$1.65 million permanent mortgage (to be paid from the General Fund) is \$14,284/month or \$171,408/year. We also have a 3 -year term loan with quarterly \$73,000 payments (\$292,000/year) provided by Keybank to allow us to collect the remainder of our Capital Stewardship Pledges. Our church is looking at \$463,000 per year in mortgage obligations for the next 3 years until the term loan is paid off. St. Luke's needs everyone's financial support to the extent that they can provide it over the next 3 years. Special thanks to Brad Martin, who facilitated our relationship with Keybank and to Jack Crumplar who negotiated the loan for St. Luke's.

Journey Bible Study: If you are looking for some insights as you travel on your faith journey, a mid-day hour of bible study and discussion will be starting this Fall. The group will begin with who wrote the bible and move to new and fascinating topics every few weeks. The first meeting will be held at the church on September 21st (Thursday) from 1:00 – 2:00 pm. The meetings will be hosted by Robin Fort, and there will be a table at the Fall Ministry Fair on September 10th with additional information about this study. The "Lay" test News: God's Love for All People

A Message from our Lay Leaders - By Monty Hoffman

Ephesians 2:8 For by grace you have been saved through faith; and that not of yourselves, it is the gift of God.

As you can tell from the information that you have received in *The Chronicle*, St. Luke's is looking towards its future. Last month, Dr. Evans conveyed some of the vision of the strategic planning committee. I thought that I would write some of my thoughts about the strategic plan this month.

As I contemplated what I thought the future looks like, I asked myself, "Is there a core belief of Methodism that we can build the future around?" The belief that came to mind was John Wesley's pronouncement of God's Love and Grace for all people.

John Wesley struggled through his boyhood, student and early priesthood years with feeling worthy of God's Love. Despite rigorously trying to satisfy the rules and regulations of religion as he saw them, he continually felt failure and despair in his relationship with God. Then, at a prayer meeting on Aldersgate Street in London, he felt the assurance of God's Love and Grace and his heart was strangely warmed. Like Paul and Martin Luther before him, he had discovered that a new life in Christ came from faith in God and God's Love and Grace, not what he did or said.

Out of this struggle and feeling of assurance, Wesley developed the sense that if God's Love was for him, then God's Love was for all people. This is the message that he took to the streets and factories of 18th century England and it was a radical vision for the times. It still is today.

Wesley's vision was not only that God's Love was for all people, but also that God's Love was active and seeking. God continually seeks us out instead of waiting for us to come to God. No matter how many times we turn away from God, God continually seeks to establish a right and loving relationship with us.

My vision of the future is that St Luke's can be an instrument of God's active and seeking Love for all people. It means that we will try and do God's work wherever we are called. Providing a church home for a family that has just moved to Colorado, giving material assistance to the children of Zimbabwe orphaned by AIDS, helping the people of Cambodia rebuild a country ravaged by thirty years of war are all part of our calling.

Recognizing God's Love and Grace for all people helps us recognize that God has given gifts and talents to all of God's children. Our ministry and mission are not just about giving, but also receiving; not just about teaching, but also learning; not just about telling, but also listening. They are, as Dalay told us, about sharing life. When our mission team returned from Zimbabwe, everyone that I talked to felt that they had received so much from the people of Zimbabwe that they came back with more than they left with. If we are open to God's Love and Grace in all people's lives we will be blessed with receiving much more than we give.

I hope that you will continue to think about and pray about the future of St Luke's. Please be involved in charting the future.

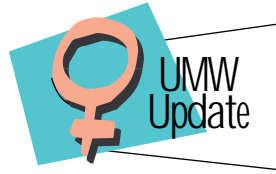

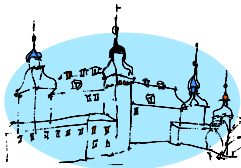
