## "One thing I'll remember most about Cambodia is laughter"

- Rich Boon performing magic tricks for the workers - and the laughter as they try to duplicate the tricks - and can't.
- Dancing in a conga line with women from St. Luke's to pack the sand down between the bricks of a newly laid floor.
- Watching Brett and Marla play soccer with the local kids - and hearing the children's laughter.
- The children were all so interested in us and learned all our names. We tried to learn their names - ending with mixed results, but always lots of laughter.
- At the celebration of our last night in Siem Reap, some of the young people taught several of us a Cambodian dance. Our efforts produced lots of laughter!
- Listening to the quiet laughter of the local women who are preparing our meals. They sit together working as they talk, share and laugh about life. Such a wonderful way of life - I find myself envious.



Someone recently asked me why I went to Cambodia. I expected to work hard - and I got what I expected there. But I got so much more than I ever gave. The people not only accepted us into their community, but they let us into their hearts as well. The children laughed and played with us - they learned our names and

# Pastors notes

On the way back from Cambodia, Rich Boon videotaped the team members answering the question, "What was the one thing that left the strongest impression?" I managed to escape the taping, but here is my answer. First I would fudge the question, and give several answers!

The first impression had to do with the power of a vision to shape new life for many people. The contrast between two visions was so striking. The vision of the Khmer Rouge, and the vision/dream of Joseph Chan; the former a vision for death, the latter a vision for life. The Khmer Rouge sought to take the country back to "year zero," and form an agrarian utopia. As a result, over two million people died, from starvation, disease, execution and war. They taught hate, mistrust, fear, and tried to extinguish hope for any other life. For over two decades, Joseph dreamed of returning to Cambodia, to bring the hope of Christianity, and new possibilities for life through churches, orphanages, a community center—enabling children to go to school, and adults to get vocational training.

Your support enabled them to secure four plots of land, build two dormitories, a vocational training center, purchase supplies (beds, desks, kitchen supplies, etc.), dig four wells, and construct two bathrooms with septic tanks.

A second impression had to do with the children—their eagerness to learn, and their willingness to share. When we taught an English class, many were on the edges of their seats, pencils poised, hanging on every word. That wasn't due so much to teaching skill as it was their eagerness to learn. When we handed out suckers after Sunday School, even though they may never have had one before, the older children helped the younger ones come up and get one. No one pushed anyone out of the way. They took turns, lick for lick, until everyone had one. If you tried to give one to someone who already had a sucker, instead of grabbing for another, she or he would say they already had one.

One of the most poignant moments for me was the last night at our celebration and communion service. The village chief had spread the word that we were going to serve food, and there would be pop—Coke, 7-Up, something most people couldn't afford. Kids were given sandwiches, they had never seen before. There were over 300 people. Most had never been to a worship service, and didn't really know what was going on. But they knew there was something different there, there was life there, there was hope there.

We used the words for communion that we use at St. Luke's: "We bring bread from a world where some have enough to eat, and many are hungry. We bring juice from a world where some have leisure, and many struggle to survive."

In that setting, at that table, we were one.

At St. Luke's we say that we believe that all people are a part of the Family of God. But we usually experience that in our own terms, on our own turf. As we step outside our own horizons of meaning and assumption, we too become open to new realities, new possibilities for life.

The Spanish Christian philosopher Miguel de Unamuno says that if you want to know what a person's real faith is, you have to find out not what they say they believe, but what they really hope for. Their dream. What is your dream? So that what? For whom? May we dream impossible dreams, for all God's people.

## Jenita Rhodes

*Co-Director of Children's Ministries*

If you can't find Jenita in the St. Luke's office, she may be down in the new Sunday School wing drawing giant sized nativity figures on sheets of paper taped to the wall. Or, she may be recruiting more members to participate in children's ministry, or kicking back to read the latest Newbery Award winning books. But chances are also good that she's spending time with her own two kids.

Jenita grew up in Salina, Kansas. As a high school senior in the color guard, she met a freshman from Kansas State who played the bugle in the Drum and Bugle Corps. His name was David Rhodes. After high school, Jenita claims she wasn't going to choose a college just to be near some man, so she chose to attend Emporia State Teacher's College. However, the next year she transferred to Kansas State and eventually married that bugler.

After Jenita earned her degree in business marketing, she and David moved to Kansas City where she worked in banking for about 10 years. After the birth of their son Doug, Jenita went back to school for her MBA. The family then moved to Pueblo, Colorado, where Jenita was a stay-home mother. When Jenita was expecting her second child, she had a dream telling her the child's name and spelling - her daughter, Jenelle.

When the family moved up to the Denver area, Doug was in kindergarten. Jenita began working at the kids' school, and was the volunteer coordinator at Northridge for four years. After that she was the librarian for two years. Her goal was to reach kids, both spiritually and academically. While she had considered taking a position within the church before, the opening last fall caught her by surprise. While she didn't really feel "done" with her position at the library and hadn't been as involved with Sunday School for several years, she decided to take a "leap of faith" and apply. She has found that the position is a great fit, and she especially appreciates the supportive people that surround her at St. Luke's.

Jenita has a lot of plans for children's ministries at St. Luke's. She says that her goal is to "get as many adults involved in children's ministry as I possibly can." She would like to involve people with and without kids, singles and young married couples as well as empty-nesters. She realizes that kids need mentoring adults in their lives in addition to their parents, and that Sunday School may not reach all of them. Opportunities to watch for include special events, Wednesday or Friday night programs for kids, and possibly a puppet ministry. She has a special interest in creating multi-generational links in a community where we may be separated from our own extended families.

In her spare time, Jenita still enjoys reading the literature for children and young adults that she spent so much time with as a school librarian. In addition to great writing, she likes reading these books because they lack the sex, violence, and strong language that seem to work their way into so many books for adults. She enjoys sewing and crafts but seldom has the time to do them unless she is working on a project at the church with the kids. She also enjoys gardening, although she admits that much of what she plants just goes to seed. When given a choice, she tends to spend her time nurturing young people instead.

The women cared for us in only the way a mother can, and they shared their life stories with us - as well as their quiet smiles. At our celebration service and dinner, the young men and women shared their joy of life - inviting us to dance with them, teaching us the dance steps and sharing our laughter as we clumsily moved through dance steps that seemed so graceful when they performed them. The men of the community worked side by side with us on the building - all the while sharing jokes and trying to laugh just like Dan Raap. Dan has such a wonderful laugh and smile. I'm not sure how I'll ever repay the people of Siem Reap for all they've given me.

## The "Lay" test News: Why Am I Important?

When I was a young adult, first separated from the support of my family, I struggled with the question of why I was important in the world. Did it have to do with what I owned, whom I knew, or how much power I had? Was life about winning and losing? It was only after I understood the Wesleyan vision of God's Love for all people did I realize that my value wasn't about any of these things. I am important because I am a child of God and loved by God. I am loved and valued by God for who I am and where I am, not for what I might become or what I might do.

I was reminded of this again at the January service done by the families of children with special needs. During the service, the parents made the point that what they had received from St Luke's that was important was the support of the community as they dealt with the burdens imposed by the special needs of their children. Just as importantly, they were glad that they weren't pitied. Their children were valued and loved by them and brought joy and love to their families. Their children, like me, are loved and valued by God for who they are and where they are.

It is important for us as a church family to be inclusive towards all people, and not just for what we can do for them. Like all of us at St Luke's, people with special needs are ministers also. I urge you to get to know them and let them minister to you. They will show you the power that God's Love has as you deal with the difficulties of life. They will teach you that, whatever your needs and abilities, you are a child of God, loved and valued by God.

### Q: What is our next step for Cambodia?

**A:** "Dreaming Impossible Dreams" was the theme for the worship service that the Cambodia Mission Team presented following our trip. Dreaming impossible dreams... Joseph Chan, our United Methodist General Board of Global Ministries missionary in Cambodia survived the Killing Fields. He lost most of his friends and family, was taught to hate, to trust no one, and to forget what it is to hope. And yet, he dreamt the impossible. He dreamt of going back to Cambodia, of rebuilding love and trust and hope, and life for Cambodia. After having entered the United States as a refugee, he kept the hope and dream alive for 18 years, and shared his dream with as many people as he could touch through his life.



He ministered to people in pain and need through local church ministry, he taught ESL classes in the public schools to Cambodia refugee children, mobilized his small community to have a voice in the international arena and United Nations, and found a way to make a place for Cambodia on the agenda of the national denominational structures of the United Methodist Church. "I can do nothing, nothing", he repeated, "but God can do everything. We want to share hope for a meaningful life. With God, we share hope".

After 18 years, Joseph finally made it back to Cambodia, and continues to dream. There is much to be done. Just in the community center that St. Luke's has helped develop, the dream includes a rural clinic and especially a dental clinic for all those (especially children) who have no medical care, on-site vocational training, instruction in English for children and adults, Christian education, clean water and assistance for basic needs, as well as working towards a more humanitarian and just government.

Now that we have shared life with our brothers and sisters in Cambodia, through Dalay Dy (our missionary in residence over the summer) having become a part of our family, through our combined efforts at fundraising through the year, through our trip, through the sharing of our hopes and dreams for life together... we are involved. We are part of the same family and our lives are now thrown together in the same boat. As our communion liturgy goes, "at this table all share the cup of pain and of celebration..."

Our next step will require for us to dream, and most of all, it will require all of us. It will require all of us, as a family of God, to pray together, to listen for continued possibilities for life for St. Luke's and for Cambodia, and be willing to dream the impossible dreams that become "mission possible". What will a "future with hope" look like for all of us? The Cambodia Mission Team will be hosting a movie night in the near future where we will present an hour-long feature film (from on-site footage), share of some of our stories, and dream about the next steps and future for St. Luke's and Cambodia. Let us continue to pray and dream, plant gardens and lay bricks together!

**Who Is Vijay?** Did you know that SLY has adopted a ten-year-old boy through Compassion International? His name is J. Vijay Anand and he lives in the southern part of India, in Erode. Vijay lives with other boys in a boarding home there. Most of the boys there are from remote villages where their families live in mud huts with no electricity or bathroom facilities. More than half of the adults are unemployed and the rest struggle to make a living as farm laborers. Our support of Vijay provides him with health education and health care that includes nutritious meals, vitamins, eye exams, and health screening. Most boys suffer from malnutrition when they arrive at the home so health care and food are most important. Vijay also receives textbooks, school fees and tuition, and clothing. He also is surrounded by Christian teachers and attends Christian Education classes. The cost to sponsor a child is \$28 per month.
