THE GIFT THAT KEEPS ON RECEIVING

Connecting at St. Luke's through giving, caring and sharing

Lisa Bryan has a gift of giving and while she is giving away her gift of volunteering she is also receiving over and over again. Lisa is co-chairperson of St. Luke's Caring Connection. Her primary responsibility is coordinating the visits to people who are in the hospital, recovering at home from surgery, driving to and from doctors appointments and visiting nursing home residents. Dawn Branch is the other co-chairperson of Caring Connection and is responsible for arranging meals for those in need.

If you ask Lisa about Caring Connection, be prepared to listen to some remarkable stories from a person excited about using her gifts to serve other people, God and St. Luke's Church. One story is about a member of St. Luke's, Mary Ottley. Mary had fallen and went into a coma. Mary's recovery started at a rest home when Lisa first met her. Lisa visited Mary once a week over a period of several months. During this time Lisa did everything she could to encourage Mary's recovery. Mary was unable to walk and her speech was affected by the coma. Each week Lisa would do her nails, bring snacks, help her get dressed, listen to her, be a friend and advocate for her recovery and return to a home. After three months of recovery Lisa saw Mary slowly learn to sit up, walk and be self-sufficient. Lisa assisted Mary in finding an assisted living facility and visited her at her new place once a week. Mary is at home now and is driving her own car. Lisa and Mary still visit. Or the time Louise Smith was having abdominal pains and called Lisa for help. Louise's family was out of town. Lisa took Louise to the emergency room and stayed with her through an emergency surgery until her family was back in town a few days later.

Lisa spends 10-15 hours a week with Caring Connection making visits at least twice a week, coordinating other volunteer visitors, writing the Caring Connection newsletter and handling other administrative matters. She's even set up a desk in the special Caring Connection corner in her home.

Pastors notes

How many of you have ever watched the World Wrestling Federation–WWF? Be honest! Recently Frank DeFord was giving his regular Wednesday sports essay, in which he told a story about John Westerhoff, who teaches at the Duke Divinity School. Westerhoff took his students to a WWF match. In fact, they went several times. (They had to pay for both tuition and tickets for this experience.) Westerhoff asked them to take a look. "Look around. What do you see? What do you notice?"

They saw that people usually sat in the same place week after week. They had food and drinks with them. They had specific ways of speaking... or yelling. These were like rituals they followed, religiously. Like we do. We tend to sit in the same place. We have things we say and do, regularly, as a part of a service.

And there in the center ring, is the biggest ritual of all. There, Westerhoff said, you have acted out, in a dramatic (if contrived) way, the cosmic struggle of good versus evil. Good guy versus bad guy. And it seems like the bad guy is always going to win; then (usually), the good guy will turn the tables, and defeat the bad guy. Good wins. Evil is defeated. And there is hope.

That is the drama we are supposed to see in church, Westerhoff said. Maybe I should shave my head like Jesse Ventura, and wrestle Jim Ramsey, just to reenact the drama! Of course, he would be the good guy.

But we don't have to do that. One drama we rehearse during Lent is the problem in theology known as "theodicy." God is all-powerful. God is good. Bad things happen. You can have any two of those, but not all three. Different religions try to solve the problem in different ways.

Karma: You're just getting what you deserve.

Illusion: It's all in your head.

Christianity doesn't really provide a theoretical answer. It points to the cross, and says that there is no evil so dark and so obscene that God can't turn it something into good.

In Tuesdays with Morrie, the dying teacher says, "Life is a series of pulls back and forth. You want to do one thing, but you are bound to do something else. Something hurt you, yet you know it shouldn't. You take certain things for granted, even when you know you should never take anything for granted... A tension of opposites, like a pull on a rubber band. And most of us live somewhere in the middle." Mitch, a former student, now spending Tuesdays with his dying teacher, says, "Sounds like a wrestling match." "A wrestling match." He laughs. "Yes, you could describe it that way." "So which side wins?" Morrie smiles, crinkled eyes, crooked teeth. "Love wins. Love always wins."

Not in the short run, maybe, but God's love wins. See you in church.

Remembering Columbine

Next month marks the two year anniversary of the Columbine massacres, and whether they like it or not, the families involved continue to be in the news. Lawsuits, autopsies, and even the return of victims' clothing have made recent headlines. The school shootings just a few short weeks ago in San Diego, California put some of the painful memories of Columbine back in the news. We at St. Luke's, as well as the general public, must never allow ourselves to forget the lessons learned from the Columbine tragedy, and should continue to keep the victims and their families in our prayers. For many, the nightmare will never end.

We each live in Colorado for a variety of reasons, but most of us live in this beautiful state by choice. Many of us view our state as one of the best places in this country, if not on earth, to live and raise a family. Consequently, in those early months of 1999, we naturally and innocently went about our personal day-to-day lives, and to some extent, focused more on the weaknesses in distant lands than here on our

own turf. And there were certainly many global issues of valid concern, but on April 20th, Columbine grabbed and dragged us back home, forcing us to acknowledge an inconceivable local horror.

Although there were some preceding signs of pending trouble, most were disguised or hidden until Columbine unmasked serious, and overlooked problems in our beloved Rocky Mountain state. Columbine woke us up to the fact that we still have much work to do in teaching our youth right here in Colorado to bury their differences, not each other. Columbine screamed to us to spend more time talking and listening to our children. Columbine taught us that our own children must be our highest priority, and the long-term solution to our social ills in Colorado, America, and worldwide is to arm our children with intelligence, compassion, and sophistication, not guns and hatred.

For those who have been directly touched by the Columbine tragedy, their lives will never be the same. For the rest of us, we must never allow our lives, or our great state, to be the same either.

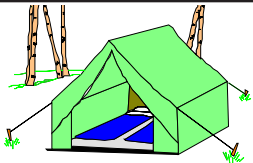
