••••••• Everyone remembers the first day of kindergarten. I do. The children might remember my story from Children's Time some time back. Having just emigrated from Korea, I walked into a strange place, looking different, embarrassed, not speaking the same language. Feeling like I would never belong. Then, someone put her hand in mine and said, "come sit with me". With one invitation, the strange place became home, and this little girl, Elizabeth, my best friend.

You were my first church appointment. Here, I learned to become a minister. Or rather, being a minister became a part of me. I learned that church is a place for the disconsolate. *Columbine*. I learned that church is a place of becoming. *IRM. (Invitational. Relational. Missional.)* I learned that church is where life is shared with all of the family of God. *Cambodia.* I will remember my "first church" like my first day in kindergarten. How with your invitations a strange place became home, how through an unfamiliar role I discovered myself. And how you became my family.

I will remember my last day at St. Luke's like my last night at my mom and dad's house before my wedding. As I was packing up my bedroom, getting ready to move out of their house and into my own the next morning, my mom knocked on the door. As usual, she poked her head in to tell me it was time to go to bed (until the day I got married I had a strict 10:30 curfew!). We both knew that this would be the last time there would be an occasion for her say these familiar (and previously annoying) words to me. I hesitated a second, and wished there were some way to say, "Thank you for everything. And good-bye." But, we found no way of ritualizing that significant moment. I continued to pack, and could only say, "O.K. mom. Good night."

LIFE. It is full of hellos and goodbyes. This "Pastor's Notes" column says "Goodbye" to two staff members, Dottie Mann and Esther Cho. Dottie has stepped down as paid staff, and Esther is returning to Harvard, to work on another advanced degree.

Dottie.

Several years ago, Dottie was volunteering with the senior high youth, in a program that was just beginning to expand. We had hired a part-time youth director, who was doing a good job, but who just over a year later decided to be a college chaplain. Because of her love for our youth, Dottie (and Deb; more on Deb in the next issue) stepped in, October 1996, and took a staff position as Director of Senior high youth. No one has ever brought more enthusiasm or more care to that position. Dottie has slept on floors; driven the van through snow; gone on bike rides; stayed up all night; and counseled them through the angst of adolescence. One of the youth said to me, "She was always there to listen as a caring but non-parental person." Dottie taught by example what it means to be a Christian. She nurtured the youth through the Columbine experience. She has taken them on mission trips to rural Appalachia, Native American Arizona, and inner-city Chicago, expanding their worlds. She has loved them all, even in those moments when they were (momentarily) "unlovable."

Dottie gave of her gifts not only to the youth, but to the whole church. Seeing that she has developed the program to a point which requires even more time, she has stepped down as paid staff, but will continue, we are thankful, as a volunteer, still loving, nurturing and guiding our youth. Thank you, Dottie.

Esther.

"Serendipity." Three years ago we were in the process of looking for a new associate minister. I was having lunch with someone, who invited Esther to come along. About five minutes into the conversation, I invited Esther to join our staff. At that point, her plans were to return to Harvard, but she changed her plans and joined us on April 15, 1998.

"Providence." It was more than just serendipity that Esther came to St. Luke's. "Providence" is a better description. In the book of Esther, Mordecai says to her, "Who knows? Perhaps you have come to [this place, this situation] for just such a time as this." (Esther 4:14) In the last three years, Esther has helped take us to "the next level" as a community of faith.

"Gifts and Graces." This is church talk for what a person brings to ministry. Few people bring as much as Esther. Leading worship; delving into a Biblical text; translating that text to our lives; helping shape a vision for our future; developing various ministries; planning worship; sharing with children; critical, creative thinking; compassionate caring; connecting us with Cambodia; thoughtful prayers; and playful enthusiasm (en theos; having God within). She has made me work harder. ("You misunderstood the scripture.") And better. ("What if we...") She was willing to laugh at herself. On the hay ride: "Is that a cow or a bull?" "It's a horse!" (O.K, she didn't have her contacts in.) But it is not the individual or constellation of gifts that matter the most. It was her authentic self. "Thanks" is always the proper response to receiving a gift. Thank you, Esther, for sharing yours with us.

"Goodbye." "Goodbye" is a contraction of "God be with you." As we thank you for all you have shared with us, as you take your next Providential steps in growing "toward full humanity," however you choose to do that with the Family of God, that is my/our prayer: God be with you. Pyong Ahn.

She pays the bills for St. Luke's, booking each expenditure to the correct account and comparing spending to the budget, and prepares the monthly and annual financial reports that go to Ad Council and the

Finance Committee. Staff members are nice to Carole Sue - not only does she check that their spending is on budget, but she's also in charge of payroll! Carole Sue also performs these same financial duties for Little School.

This financial wonder woman was born and raised in Honolulu, Hawaii. So how did she end up in Highlands Ranch? At the age of 18 she felt ready for a change and went to Boston to attend college, where she saw her first snow. She also spent some time in Colorado before completing her degree in Accounting and Psychology back home in Hawaii. Giving Our Best to Children: Teaching Sunday School By Dennis Becker

The St. Luke's basement is abuzz with activity on any Sunday morning. With over 600 children sixth grade and under on the Sunday School roll at St.Luke's, a host of people keep the Sunday school going. People like Danny and Susan McIntosh. Danny and Susan McIntosh have two sons; Emerson, age 3, and Bennett, age 6. But Emerson and Bennett are not the primary reasons Danny and Susan teach the first grade Sunday School class roughly once a month. Sure, they do feel some responsibility to teach since they have children in the Sunday School. However, their reasons for teaching are much deeper. Teaching is not an obligation for the McIntoshes. Teaching is a way of life and a way to be involved in the ministry at St. Luke's. Danny and Susan have been teaching off and on beginning in college. They have taught many ages from pre-school to adult. Recently, *The Chronicle* interviewed Susan and Danny just after they'd finished teaching 17 bubbly first graders on a Sunday morning.

The Chronicle: Why do you teach Sunday school?

Danny: Teaching Sunday School is fun. It's fun to be with the kids. It's enjoyable to put the lessons together and to think about what you really want the students to learn. Teaching is also a learning experience for me as I get insights from the children.

Susan: Teaching is also a wonderful way to get involved in the church. We get to work with the students in Sunday School and to some degree with their parents. We also get to work with other teachers and get to know a lot of neat people. Each class has three adults teaching and interacting with the children on a given Sunday.

Danny: Teaching is also a way for us to use our gifts of teaching and to be involved in what we feel passionate about.

The Chronicle: What do you hope to give by teaching?

Danny: We have the opportunity to teach children about things that are most important such as our beliefs about God's love and loving people. It's great to see their eyes light up and their faces break into a smile. You know then that they got the idea.

<u>The Chronicle:</u> What do you receive from teaching?

Susan: We really learn a lot from the kids. We learn what they think is important to them. We learn about life from their perspective. We also get to watch other teachers and to sharpen our skills from seeing how they teach or handle a particular situation.

Danny: Surprisingly, teaching Sunday School energizes us. It's fun and we're involved in something important.

<u>The Chronicle</u>: Do you have a favorite teaching experience you'd share with the people of St. Luke's?

Susan: A few weeks ago we focused in our worship service on people who are physically challenged. In Sunday school the students went from room to room and experienced in a small way various physical challenges. The children learned from that experience what it feels like to be different and that it is ok to the physically different. Or the time a boy said to me, "I'm not having a good day." I was able to help him see that he was not having a good morning, but that the day could get better.

The Chronicle: With many teachers at St. Luke's like Danny and Susan McIntosh, many children will learn what is important and their day's and lives will get better.
