# Pastors notes

from Reverend Richard Evans

## Spring's Hope Eternal...

During this time of Lent, beginning with Ash Wednesday and a recognition of our mortality, we prepare ourselves for the celebration of Easter. Most of us want to get there too quickly; that is, to get there without any time in the wilderness listening for God's voice, without any Good Fridays, without death. But there is no other way to get to Easter, really.

Death is strong. It is destructive. It does more than interrupt. It ends a primary source of our happiness and meaning. So if God's love really is stronger than death, then we must deal with it not as some monkey wrench thrown into the gears of life, but as one of the gears itself. Then we are ready to experience Easter—Spring's Hope Eternal. This means that Easter is more than a nice time of tulip bulbs and bunnies and colored eggs. It is the story of the power of God's love to bring good out of everything. Even in such a violent spring as this one threatens to be, we walk on with hope, because we never walk alone.

## Caring Connection *By Jennifer Jiang*

There is a group at St. Luke's that has touched some of your lives, but would like to touch many more. That group is the Caring Connection. It is a group of individuals from St. Luke's, who provide support services to people in the St. Luke's community in times of need. Services the Caring Connection can provide include: bringing meals to families with new babies, illness or loss in the family; running errands or providing transportation to appointments for the elderly or "shut ins"; and companionship for individuals experiencing serious illness or recovering from surgery. Lay volunteers provide these services as a ministry of St. Luke's. Now I'd like to share with you some personal examples of some of the things we do.

When my daughter Jacqueline was about one and a half we began visiting Lola Johnson at the Hallmark Nursing Center. She had recently lost her eyesight and moved from Kansas. I was told that she was very depressed and needed some cheering up. After a couple of visits we became friends. Her voice is now full of joy each time we arrive and announce "Lola, its Jennifer and Jacqueline". She loves to talk about her family and hear all about ours and what we are doing. Lola loves to "love her up", make sure she gets a cookie, and listen to her constant chatter. But most of all, I think she likes to brag to the other residents and the workers about her special friend. She is always commenting, "they all know she's (Jacqueline) here, and are watching her like crazy!" I think the pride of having visitors perked her spirits and give her something to look forward to. We were told that after a few weeks of visiting her depression had gone and that it was in large part due to our visits. That gave me a very warm, happy feeling to know we made a difference, although, I don't like to take much credit as it was more my daughter Jacqueline. Jacqueline talks about her often and enjoys going to visit. And I feel she is learning a little about how to be caring in addition to how to relate to someone with a disability.

After my son Benjamin arrived, I received a call from Shelly Selover with the Caring Connection. She brought us a wonderful meal that really helped in our newly hectic schedule. She was also very considerate of my older daughter Jacqueline by bringing her chocolate cake and a special balloon, which then became her special designation "remember, she's the one who brought you the cake and balloon!" Following this, my neighbors also provided a meal chain. I had it all planned out that when my husband left for two weeks on a business trip, I wouldn't have to worry about meals. However, there were a couple of days that were not covered. Then Susan Hooke came to my rescue with two more meals. I don't think we would have survived those two weeks without the additional help!

And yet another example, we received this wonderful recount from Jane, Sean, William, and Andrew Damsgard Cronin:

*A week or so prior to William's initial hospitalization Sean and I were discussing the meaning of Church. To me it has always been more than just about the Bible, God, Jesus, the Trinity and Sunday worship. Church has always been there for me whenever I needed a fun outlet, my family moved to a new home, or when I needed friends and a place to belong. Church is a family and community. I told Sean if anything ever happened to us that my Church would be there. And... I have not been disappointed. The members of St. Luke's have been there for every moment of Will's illness and for our families' needs. The Caring Connection ensures we do not have to think about meals and delivers them without fail every week. They follow up often to see if there is more they can do and visit with us when they come. It is nice to see familiar families and meet new faces who care even though they we have never met. The St. Luke's Little School sends William fun toys, pictures, and cards. Rev. Dick and Rev. Dave always call and/or visit the hospital to check on us. Church members have set up blood drives and/or singularly donated blood to replace what William uses for his care. Church friends take care of baby Andrew and visit the hospital to give us a break when needed. They also visit and leave messages for us on Will's website to check in and send some cheer. I have been attending St. Luke's since attending college. I have never had to utilize the Church for a major emergency before but I am so appreciate of the help, kindness, and good thoughts ya'll always send our way. St. Luke's and its internal organizations are our community and family.*

Now that you have heard about the wonderful things we do, I ask that you keep us in mind on two accounts. First, please call us if you know someone or are someone in need. Sometimes it's hard to ask for help, but I can assure you we love to do it and it is kept in confidence. Second, if this sounds like something you feel a calling for, more helping hands are always welcome.

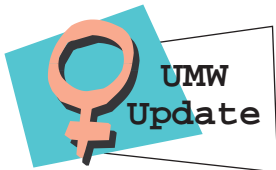

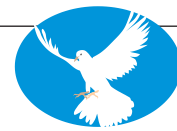

## Practicing Forgiveness

My first experiences in church were very long ago, and in a far away place called Alabama, and under a stifling national atmosphere called the Depression. It was a simple life, no frills. And church was simple. No worship bulletins, hymn numbers on a board up front. No ministerial robes, not even choir robes. And the theology was simply: you are a sinner, and must be saved by Christ, so you can go to heaven. Even as a kid I knew where I was headed, and third letter in the place's name was "l" and not "a." I knew of no Catholics in our town, so talk of "giving up something for Lent" was never heard. And, hey, what was Lent, anyway? We knew about Easter, but Lent? Similarly, we knew about Christmas, but Advent?

Well, I now understand a bit about Lent. But I'm puzzled, if something is bad enough to "give up for Lent," why not give it up for good? If it is worth giving up temporarily, maybe it should be given up permanently.

A similar thought came to me during our Ash Wednesday (never heard of that as a kid) service. If we should "do something for Lent" maybe we ought to do it all the time. Forgiveness was mentioned, so I latched onto that. Lent is an excellent ambiance in which to practice forgiveness, so we can keep up the habit

all year long, and you may be sure we'll have need for it all year long.

Forgiveness is often misunderstood as having to do with the "other person." Essentially, my forgiving him or her has nothing to do with them, it only has to do with me. If they get involved fine and good, but the action of forgiveness happens within me.

Recently, I've come across three new definitions of forgiveness. One is "permission to move forward." My forgiving someone gives me (and perhaps him) permission to move forward. Another definition I dearly love, but am still working on, is "allowing someone harmless passage through your mind." The person who harmed me can come to my mind, and I simply let him "pass on through" without any emotional rehash on my part. No anguish, no regrets, no anger, he just passes on through. Last Friday night while watching 85 year-old Billy Graham preach in Dallas I heard him give a good hi-tech theological understanding of forgiveness: "when all of your files are deleted."

Work on this idea during Lent, your forgiveness of others is not primarily for their benefit, but for your benefit. Forgiveness keeps your spirit and your mind free. And keep it up all year long.

## Refugees Need Your Help:

St. Luke's recently received an urgent letter from Ecumenical Refugee Services. They are looking for more churches to help refugees settle in the Denver area. Volunteers from churches work with assigned case workers to provide whatever support they can to a refugee family (church members do not need to arrange for housing).

Refugees are people who must flee their homeland, fearing death or persecution because of their race, religion or political views. These people must leave everything behind, including family members, material possessions, and cultural identity for the chance to rebuild a life with personal safety, individual freedom and peace. Each refugee who comes to the U.S. is carefully screened by the United Nations High Commissioners for Refugees and the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service. Refugees die from hunger, disease or exposure to the elements if they do not receive help. With the U.S. going to war means there will be even more refugees.

# Finance Report

By St. Luke's Financial Team

The general financial health of St. Luke's is fair, although there is some uncertainty with anticipated giving for 2003 that may result in a reduction in the 2003 budget.

At the beginning of 2002, the leadership of the church determined that a budgeted deficit was in order due to some anticipated increases in giving over the course of the year. The budgeted giving for 2002 was \$907,780 and included General Pledges, Loose Plate Collections, Grocery Coupons, and Interest Income. The budgeted expenses for 2002 were \$955,729, for a budgeted deficit of \$47,949. The beginning cash balance on Jan. 1, 2002 was \$178,540 (adjusted for stock holdings), and the budgeted cash balance for Dec. 31, 2002 was \$130,591.

Although giving increased by more than \$25,000 versus budget, the anticipated increase in giving did not happen to the degree hoped for. The end of year actual giving (including other income) was \$933,351. Actual expenses came in at \$967,817, or \$12,088 more than the 2002 budget of \$955,729. This was due in large

part to the unanticipated water main break. Repairs exceed \$12,000. The deficit for 2002 was \$34,466, and the ending cash balance is \$144,073. So the year end summary is that we did better than budgeted, but not as well as hoped for.

In part, this is due to shortfalls in giving. While pledges for 2002 totaled \$863,580, we received only 83% of those pledges. This compares to an Actual:Pledge ratio of 89% for 2001. This difference of 6% represents a gap of \$49,000 in giving.

The initial proposed budget for 2003 was \$1,076,000, representing a 12.5% increase over 2002. The budget was contingent on achieving similar giving estimates based on the 2002 Stewardship campaign. Unfortunately, as described in the Stewardship section, the campaign did not yield sufficient funds to support the proposed budget. The budget for 2003 has been revised down to \$934,200. This represents a reduction of nearly \$142,000 from the proposed budget, and a reduction of 3.5% from 2002 actual spending. As stated in the letter to the congregation dated late Feb., there will be significant impacts to ministry programs.

**The Wesleyan Tradition—Part IV: God’s Love for All People**

Because Methodism is not strongly doctrinal, Methodists sometimes have trouble coming up with a short answer when asked, “What do you believe?” Here are two short answers that state our distinctness, our tradition, and the ideas that many of our beliefs are grounded in.

We believe that God loves all people even when they are undeserving of that love. We believe that God’s grace is active in all people’s lives, even when they are unaware of its presence.

These two statements present a vision of a God who is active in our lives, a God who wants to establish a relationship with all people. It is a vision of a God who does not pick and choose based on predetermination or doctrine, but a God who loves all that he has created.

When John Wesley was in his boyhood, student years, and early priesthood, the predominant doctrine of salvation was the Calvinist doctrine of election, the idea that those who were worthy of God’s Love were predetermined and all of the rest were damned. Wesley himself felt only a sense of despair, failure, and anxiety about his relationship with God as he tried to make himself worthy of God’s Love through his actions. What made Wesley recognize God’s Love for all people?

First of all, his study of the scripture prepared him. Wesley was strongly influenced by Paul’s letter to the Romans. Second, tradition played a part. Through the Moravians, he was introduced to Martin Luther’s Treatise on Romans as a study guide to the Epistle. Third, it was the experience of God in his life. Through faith and grace, Wesley felt the assurance of God’s Love in his life, but he did not feel that this was because he was special but rather because God’s Love was special. God’s Love for him was proof to Wesley that God’s Love was for all people.

I hope that you see St. Luke’s core values in these two statements. We are invitation- al because God loves all people and through his grace invites all people to his church. We are relational because that is how we help each other live faithfully and invite God’s grace into our lives. We are missional because God calls us to care for all of his children, whether they are across the street, across town, or on the other side of the world.

Remember, God loves you and there is nothing you can do about it. Pass it on.

Against this expense budget, we anticipate giving and other income to be \$930,600. This assumes an Actual:Pledge ratio of 85%, and additional giving in excess to pledges of almost \$190,000. This additional giving comes from members and constituents who give, but do not pledge, and from pledges from new members (100 new members for 2002). This estimate equals 2002 experience.

There are also additional areas of income that are tied to specific budget areas. Specifically, there are three significant areas where additional programs are funded by incremental giving specific to those programs. These programs are Music, Missions, and Youth Ministries/ Missions.

In each of these areas, fundraisers occur frequently to augment the amount budgeted from General Giving. Additionally, St. Luke’s receives over \$20,000 in building use fees that augment the Trustees budget. Similar to 2002, we anticipate that we will receive \$66,000 in additional funds for 2003. The effect of this \$66,000 is to provide additional funds to the General Budget, increasing the overall budget to \$1,000,200, from than \$934,200, which is the net amount that is funded by pledges and other giving.

St. Luke’s staff has also succeeded in transitioning the accounting to a new software package (Church Windows). This will allow for more detailed reporting of the financial status of the church.

**Charge Conference**

On Sunday, Mar. 9th, St. Luke’s had a Charge Conference. We did two pieces of required CC business: approved the senior pastor’s compensation package, and elected officers. As information vital to our congregation, but not requiring CC action, we looked at the budget, which had been previously approved by the Executive Board, and looked at a partial review of how it is going with St. Luke’s.

An annual Charge Conference is required by The Discipline, our administrative “bible” in the United Methodist Church. It is conducted by the District Superintendent, or in his/her absence, by an elder of the superintendent’s choosing. Since our D.S. could not be here, Dick presided over the meeting, only to turn it over to me when we got to the senior pastor’s compensation (a protocol), and for the election of officers submitted by the Committee on Lay Leadership, of which Dick is chairperson (another protocol). Dick and I are the only elders in our church. Being an elder has nothing to do with age, it has to do with our being ordained as an Elder.

Normally, our Charge Conferences are held in the fall, which ours was, and this second one on March 9 was just to “clean up” some old business. If you could not be present, don’t lose any sleep over it, but put it in your mental registry to be present at our next one in the fall. A Charge Conference is similar to your annual physical with your physician. It is a check up, a “how are we doing,” a “where are we going,” in addition to doing some nitty gritty business. Officially you should be there because regardless of whether you hold any “office” or not, our Charge Conferences are almost always held as Church Conferences, and that means all full members of St. Luke’s have a vote.

Additionally, more church group accounts are being consolidated under Finance management, although the restrictions on the funds are being maintained (e.g., youth funds are still restricted to youth missions). During 2003, we will define the new reporting requirements and will be able to present a more detailed and complete financial view to the Charge Conference.
