Senior pastor interviews begin this month

On August 4, the St. Luke's Church Profile was presented to Rev. John Thompson, District Superintendent for the Rocky Mountain Conference of the United Methodist Church. The presentation was made by David Necker, Sean McCurdy, and Dave Bebell of our Staff-Parish Relations Committee (SPRC). As a part of the Profile, all of the ideas from St. Luke's congregation and constituency were included, in their entirety.

The Search Committee believed that including all comments received would give a stronger picture of St. Luke's to the conference Cabinet and to prospective Senior Ministers. For those of you interested in reading the input, a copy of the Profile is available in the church office.

Next steps: In early September, Rev. Thompson will meet with the Conference Cabinet to consider candidates to recommend for St. Luke's opening. We expect to be interviewing the first of these candidates

TWENTIETH BIRTHDAY

I can't remember my twentieth birthday. I know it happened on 17 November 1945, but I don't remember it as an event. My best guess is nothing happened, except that I went into the radio room in the hanger at our little airport in Nome, Alaska, and I pulled my shift as a radio operator. In the U. S. Army Air Corps we didn't make much of birthdays.

It could be that many of us now don't do much with birthdays. But this Twentieth birthday of St. Luke's UMC should be celebrated with some dignity and style. We're past the actual date, but the day for our big celebration is Sunday, 7 September, and it's coming up real soon.

The easy part for you, unless you're one of many who are helping create this bash, is to just show up for worship on the 7th. There'll only be one BIG service at 10:30. Then stick around for the catered barbecue lunch, and the Ministry Fair. And there's lots more for everyone.

Why is this birthday important? Reassessment, taking stock, celebrating where we've been, visioning where we're going, re-committing to our highest ideals and dreams. Remember, it can't happen for you unless you are present. So nail down the time and date now: 10:30 a.m., 7 September.

Twenty years is not very old for a church, but most all churches in Highlands Ranch are young. Those older than twenty are transfer churches from somewhere in the Denver area. One of the good thing about our age is that we don't have a contingent that objects to anything new by saying, "Well, hurmph, we have never done it that way before." Or, "We tried that about 30 years ago, and it didn't work." It is encouraging to have an open future, with a congregation willing to experiment, to try and perhaps fail, and then try again and succeed.

And it is encouraging to have members with varying backgrounds. We have members with practically no church background, some with backgrounds such as Methodist, and quite a few, what I called in a previous church, "recovering Catholics." In these post-modern times the old traditional patterns of church are being rewritten. And this to me is a good sign.

One man whose writings I appreciate, retired Bishop Spong of the Episcopal Church, has a book called, "Why Christianity Must Change of Die." I think St. Luke's is on the cutting edge of what churches will need to become in the future. It indeed is a challenge and privilege to be associated with St. Luke's. See you on the Seventh.

After a long day and even longer night, I was finally at the best time of the day, saying goodnight prayers and cuddling with my daughter. I am inviting you to make a commitment to yourself in this overcommitted world we live in. Seek to be relational. Join others in your journey. Share your story and watch yourself soar. Personally, I am still searching and will continue to do so. I take risks, talk with people I don't know, ask questions, review my commitments. It isn't always easy but it is always rewarding. And I thank you for the chance I have everyday to be relational. God's grace can and does make one weep with joy. I pray each one of you may share in this joy.

Methodist Church in Kielce. **Poland** makes urgent

request

One of the things I learned this summer while working with the Methodist Church in Kielce, Poland, was that Pastor Janusz Daszuta very much wants to renovate his church. The following are Pastor Daszuta's own words:

"After a long time the city officials finally gave our small Methodist Church in Kielce (40 members), the official permission to enlarge our chapel, so it can be now twice as big as it is now. Right now its size is only 15 feet wide and 30 feet long. As you see, it's not a large place. On Sundays we have up to 60 people attending and it is quite crowded and hot. We do not have much space for Sunday school with children.

Therefore, we are looking for some ways to enlarge our existing chapel. Our people have taxed themselves and regularly give to the church for this purpose. Thus we were able to pay, with the help of friends, for the big part, which is the blue prints, permission, electricity connections. The project will include building on the existing foundation onto the first floor about two yards upwards to create the second floor which is just an attic now. What is more, we have just found out that part of the chimney on the attic has collapsed, so as you see the project is becoming even more urgent....

"However, the whole project will cost \$60,000. We can do this project in different stages, however in order to change the main structure of this building we will need to raise about \$35,000-\$40,000. The rest of this renovation we can do with the help of construction teams, room by room with much less money. Due to our difficult financial situation, quite a few people have no jobs in our church, we have to look for some help outside of Poland. When I watch the plans I am so excited about that possible future place of our worship and ministry in our city.

"You should know, that many people in Poland, as they look at our present chapel, they seem to be very suspicious, because they think that in the houselike facility only some kind of religious sect holds its meetings. It seems to me that this kind of situation was OK during the communist system. However, now we live in a new time, and I wish we could have a place which in its structure is inviting and ready to welcome all of our visitors. Now it is very difficult to do that."

Pastor Daszuta requested financial help from the Methodist Church headquarters in Poland, but the money they have has been allocated to other projects. My goal is to work through the United Methodist General Board of Global Ministries to set up a Methodist-wide fund in the U.S. for this project and

Reflections on mission trip to Poland By Betsy Keyack

Overview

I recently returned from a mission trip to Poland, along with Lisa Lehnus of St. Luke's and Terri Lowe from St. Andrew's UMC. Our mission project was to help at a Christian Family Camp sponsored by the Methodist Church in Kielce. The camp was in the mountains about 2 hours from Krakow. We had a great trip! These are some reflections on my experience in Poland.

Friendships

The most rewarding part of the trip for me was making friends with many wonderful Polish adults and children. I have great memories of interesting conversations, shared experiences and gestures of love and kindness. While we were able to communicate with many people in English, the common language was Love. Since returning home, I have written to some of my new friends and have received letters as well.

Religion

Poland is about 95% Catholic, with about 75% practicing. Pastor Janusz Daszuta of the Kielce Methodist Church said people who choose to be Protestants are not comfortable in Poland. He would like to see more respect and fellowship across the faiths. His philosophy is to "share our faith through works of love to the community." One way he tries to do this is inviting people of all faiths to camps such as the one we attended.

The Poland Connection


We want to have a continuing relationship between St. Luke's, St. Andrew's and the Kielce Methodist Church. We would like to have pen pals and a prayer connection. We could share Englishlanguage resources for ministry to children and parents. Pastor Daszuta also invites us to come and help with their future camps and/or Vacation Bible Schools!

Another opportunity for a connection is the orphanage next door to Pastor Daszuta's church; it is possible that the church and orphanage could work together on children's ministry. In addition, there are no Protestant social services in Kielce. Pastor Daszuta would like to sponsor a free meal to people in need, once or twice a week. We may want to help the church financially with its expenses and ministry programs.

To symbolize our connection, Pastor Janusz gave St. Luke's a candle, which will be dedicated on September 14. We plan to send them a candle for their church, too.

Economic conditions in Poland

Several people have asked me about the economic conditions in Poland. Poland is still struggling after the end of Communist rule. The unemployment rate is high - 25% in some places. Young people go to school and then look for jobs in other countries. Many people have little sense of hope. There is a need for entrepreneurs



with capital to come to Poland and help the people start their own small businesses.

Concentration Camps

A significant part of Poland's troubled and violent history are the concentration camps at Auschwitz and Birkenau. During our trip we visited these places. Here approximately one million Jews and others were tortured and exterminated. I have many images of the horrors that these people endured - hair being shaved off; standing naked in the cold; true stories of ordinary families being torn apart; deception before being gassed to death; piles of shoes, personal belongings and suitcases with names on them; smelly stable-like living quarters. It reminded me again of the horrors that the people of Cambodia endured under Pol Pot in the 1970's.

Positive notes from a beautiful country

- During the camp, we went to a short stretch of road in southern Poland on which cars, water bottles and other objects roll uphill. Some say it's a mystery, some say it's an optical illusion. I haven't figured it out!
- The Polish people make terrific candy and chocolate, along with fantastic pierogies and bigosu (a cabbage dish).
- Poland has some truly spectacular mountain scenery, in addition to green rolling farmland as far as the eye can see.

An opportunity to serve

In an effort to explore ways members at St. Luke's can get involved with local organizations, the missions committee members will be reviewing nearby programs that are making a difference for people in Colorado.

This month a representative visited us from Work Options for Women (WOW). Their mission statement is to help low-income women gain the skills and confidence they need to work their way out of the cycle of poverty and into self-sufficiency.

WOW runs a food service training program that prepares students for employment in all aspects of food service production on a large scale. Training includes food preparation, safety, sanitation and utensil handling skills. The venue for this training is definitely "hands on". They prepare food from scratch five days a week for 300 at the Denver Department of Human Services employee cafeteria.

In addition, the women attend classes to learn interaction skills, job readiness, and the attitudes needed to compete for and keep employment in a competitive job market. Case management allows students to find housing, daycare, transportation and how to budget to pay for these services.

By the time they near graduation, 95% of WOW students secure employment, and 90% of graduates remain employed after graduation.

WOW has a need for volunteers to help in the cafeteria working the cash register, help in the classes teaching job and life skills. They also need financial assistance to help with uniforms, bus tokens, and job placement services.

Each workshop look at the story from a different perspective so that when the rotational unit is finished they not only know the story backwards and forwards they understand how to apply it to their daily lives.


Summit Seekers

Acolyte Training – Sunday, September 21st


