Who are we?

Have you ever driven past St. Luke's United Methodist Church on Broadway and wondered what kind of church it is? Simply put, we are a contemporary church that is firmly rooted in the 300 year old Wesleyan Tradition. That may sound like a contradiction, but it is not if you understand the Wesleyan Tradition.

As a young priest in the Church of England, John Wesley struggled with his relationship with God. Finally, during an experience of God's presence in his life during a prayer meeting, Wesley felt the assurance of God's love for him and the presence of God's grace in his life. While many of his contemporaries had felt the same thing and felt that God had chosen them as part of the elect, Wesley felt that if God loved him, God loved all people.

Wesley took this call literally and went out into the streets and fields of England and preached the good news to all of God's children. He preached the gospel thousands of times to people that the established church considered unworthy of God's love and Christ's redemption. His fellow churchmen suggested that he tend to his own parish, to which he replied, "The world is my parish."

At St. Luke's, the world is our parish, and we are actively engaged in it, not separated from it. In our worship, our programs, and our missions we reach out to the world and all of God's children in it. During the course of a month, the music that you will hear in worship will range from a three hundred year old hymn to current praise music. While we have a traditional chancel choir, we also have a praise band, a brass band, and a bell choir.

Our programs are varied and for the most part designed, implemented, and run by our lay members. If there isn't something that meets your needs or your sense of call to do something that needs to be done, you are invited to start a new program.

Our missions are designed to reach out to God's children everywhere. In addition to the connectional mission programs of the United Methodist Church, St. Luke's is active in our own mission program. We seek to help our neighbors across the street, across town, and on the other side of the world.

We are a contemporary church, engaged in the world, and rooted in a tradition, a tradition that guides us into the future instead of binding us to the past.

From your senior pastor



As of last Wednesday we are now into the season of Lent. In the Methodist Church in Alabama, at the time I was growing up, Christian seasons did not mean much. We did acknowledge and celebrate Easter, but acknowledgment of seasons did not go much beyond that. I really didn't get into the "seasons of the Christian year" until I got to seminary, and then not deeply. And since then I have not been a strict observer of the seasons, but have at least tried not to create any blunders. For instance, it has always seemed to me that if one should "give up" something for Lent, one should also give it up for all seasons. In my first church I had not noticed that our Catholic next door neighbors had given up alcohol for Lent, but I could not help but notice that they reverted back to their normal habit the minute Lent was over. Their return to routine was rather noisy.

I'm for observing Lent, not necessarily in the sense of "giving up a questionable something," but perhaps in the sense of "taking on a positive something." Rather than giving up something, which would be healthy to give up anyway, how about taking on something which would prove beneficial? . . . and then making it permanent?

I was cleaning out some old files the other day, and ran across something I titled "8 year goals: (at age 70)." I had written this at age 62, so that was 16 years ago. I cannot now possibly give myself more than a 50% achievement of those goals. Was there some present unknown spiritual impulse that got me to simultaneously look at those old goals, while anticipating taking on something for Lent? Should I look at those again with the intention that I could raise my success level from 50% to 70%, or more? One of the issues was health, and I'm doing fairly well in that department. But — the goal said "weigh no more than — a number 17 pounds less than what I now weigh." By most standards I am not overweight, but certainly not at my best "fighting weight." Would it help my spiritual growth to do something about that — "take that on" for Lent? I am sure it would not hurt one bit. And physical health does seem to have some connection to spiritual health. (Please do not standby for a report.)

What I do think is important is that we keep spiritual progress (and that encompasses health) as an ever-present program before our minds and intentions. When I first came into the Christian experience at age 21 I soon began to think that by the age of 50 I would be commonly recognized as Saint Fred. Didn't happen. Still hasn't happened. And I am sure that is not now my goal, but my goal should be, and I hope is, to keep progressing and growing along those lines. Getting into the groove of Lent, could very well be a stimulus that I need. I might even suggest it for you. Even now is not too late.

Saying good-bye

Dear Youth, Families, and Friends:

I wanted to take this opportunity to say thank you to all the people who have supported me with their prayers, kind words, cards, and phone calls. Reaching out with such love and concern is one of those characteristics of St. Luke's that I will cherish in my heart.

For many of you, my resigning as the Dir. Of Youth Ministries came as a shock and surprise, especially the abruptness by which it occurred. I know this has left many questions for many people, and instead of leaving those questions for speculation, I hope to give you some clarification.

First, I would like to reiterate what I told the youth. I am honored that I have had the last two and half years to work with the youth, the families, and all those who have come to St. Luke's during my time with you. I did not leave because of anything the youth did. The youth with their enthusiasm, hope, joy, struggles, and faith is what brought me to St. Luke's and is the reason that I have stayed for as long as I did. I enjoyed the many relationships that were formed, and I count you as among my friends. I will miss you dearly, and my continued hope and prayer is for your success as a faith community.

I originally planned to announce my resignation in June, work through the summer as a transitional period, and have moved on by September with the hope of having a new youth minister in place. As so often happens in life, plans change. My reason for leaving now is the same as why I planned to leave in June. I need time and space for myself. I have unresolved issues from past experiences that I cannot address while working for the church. Regardless of how personal the issues are, in the church, every aspect of one's life as a minister becomes open for public discussion and debate. No matter how hard one tries to separate the personal from the professional, as a minister, those lines are blurred.

I have been a minister since the fall of 1991 in one capacity or another. For over the past twelve years, I have known nothing other than the life of a minister. When I first entered ministry, I knew, as all those who choose this life do, that the life of ministry was lived in a fishbowl. When I was a peer minister in college, this did not matter so much. As time went on, the space between being myself and being a minister grew further apart. This did not matter as much when my life was following a well-ordered pattern. As that pattern dissolved, I did not have the space and separation I needed for myself. The demands of the church, and the nature of the work, did not allow me to be human and grieve. Now I will use this time to say good-bye to the past, ask were it is I wish to be, and find a direction in life where I feel called and fulfilled.

Though good-bye is always difficult, it is an inevitable part of life. I believe in the youth and the congregation of St. Luke's to make the best of this situation. I believe leadership will arise that will carry the youth ministry at St. Luke's to whole new levels. I believe in God, and I believe that God will provide.

Until we meet again, "May the Lord bless you and keep you, may the Lord make his face to shine upon you and be gracious unto you. May Lord lift up his countenance upon you, and give you peace."
