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
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Merry Christmas....Merry New Year!



Co-Director of Children's Ministries

With this edition of *The Chronicle*, we return to our series introducing the staff of St. Luke's to *Chronicle* readers. After a long selection process this fall, we have two new Co-Directors of Children's Ministries. This month, we will learn a little more about what makes Pat Dunnigan tick.

Pat was born and raised in Baltimore, MD. Her husband, Kevin, was in active duty with the Marines, so they moved around quite a bit. Pat has fond memories of 2 months in Japan that stretched

into 7 months, and also many years spent near the ocean in North Carolina. The couple moved to Colorado about 8 years ago. Kevin, a meteorologist, retired from the Marines and now works at Buckley Air Force Base. Their three daughters and 4 grandchildren also live in the area. Pat enjoys hiking here in Colorado, particularly during long weekends with her husband spent at Estes Park. It's a chance to sit and relax as well as hiking and shopping, a nice break for a busy couple. She also loves the ocean, and admits to missing it here in this land-locked state.

While in North Carolina, Pat began what is now nearly 17 years of working with children. She worked in the school system in North Carolina, and worked at another preschool in Colorado before coming to Little School over three years ago. At a smaller church in North Carolina, Pat first felt her calling to work in Children's Ministries. With fewer people in the church, Pat worked on everything from Vacation Bible School to Christmas programs. A self-proclaimed shy person, Pat was also expected to get in front of the congregation to give the children's sermon. Even though this was a challenge, she found that it felt "right," and that she had a calling to do this kind of work. She feels a connection to children and values the importance of guiding them, even when they stray.

Pat decided to apply for this position because of her strong commitment to the children of St. Luke's. She not only enjoys working with them, she feels strongly about the importance of meeting our kid's needs within the church and about letting the adult congregation know the importance of their contributions to this ministry. Pat completely supports our mission work outside of the church, but doesn't want anyone to forget this important ministry within the church, either. She is glad to say that she is here for the kids. She is here for their parents, also, but her focus is always on meeting the needs of the kids. Pat invites the adults of St. Luke's to take the time to notice our future generation down on the lower level of the church, and to consider how valuable and rewarding this ministry can be.

As Co-Director of Children's Ministries, Pat shares responsibility with Jenita Rhodes. While they work together, Pat's focus is on pre-school while Jenita focuses on elementary aged kids. Watch for an article about Jenita in the next edition of *The Chronicle*.

The "Lay" test News: Assurance

A Message from our Lay Leaders - By Monty Hoffman

"One of the important emphases which has been at the heart of the Methodist movement is the belief that we can have absolute assurance that we have entered into a new relationship with God through our faith in Jesus Christ. Although this positive assurance is a primary emphasis of Methodism, it is not a measurement of personal faith or of salvation. Assurance can be expected and should be sought but it is not an essential element of salvation." From "Proclaiming Grace & Freedom, Two Centuries of American Methodism"

John Wesley's moment of feeling assurance, his Aldersgate Experience, was a turning point in his life and ministry. Before Aldersgate, Wesley had been a failure as an Anglican priest and had lived a life filled with self-doubt about his relationship with God. After Aldersgate, Wesley felt that God loved even him and started preaching the message of God's Love for all people all over England. People responded to this message and the Methodist movement started.

Assurance has also had an important place in my faith journey. I spent many of my formative years in a community that was strongly L.D.S. (Mormon). While I was a Methodist, the missionary nature of the L.D.S. church meant that I heard a lot about its beliefs and it did have an effect on me. By the time I left for college, religion seemed to me to be about a long lists of don'ts and not at all a positive experience. I was not a regular church attendee for many years until I started going to St. Luke's in my early thirties.

Shortly after Raina and I started attending St. Luke's, Bill Selby preached a sermon on God's Love for all people and I enjoyed the message. As I stepped out into the warm April sun, I felt more than the warmth of the sun. I realized that my faith journey was not about making myself worthy of God's Love by abiding by a long list of don'ts. God's love for me was right now and I was accepted for who I was and where I was. I felt assurance.

As I reflected on this feeling, I decided that living my faith was not about what I didn't do, but what I did do. I started to look for the positive things that I could do to reflect the power of God's Love in my life. I tried to look for things that I could do to make a difference in the world, even if it only effected one other person. I quit worrying about making mistakes as I tried to live a life of love, for in God's Love is also forgiveness. In short, religion became a positive experience in my life, not a negative one. It was something that made me grow as a person, not something that limited me. Assurance changed how I lived my faith.

I hope that assurance has or will make a difference in your life as it has for me. As we start the new year, take the time to reflect on the power of God's Love in your life and how to live a life that reflects that love.

Persons with developmental or learning disabilities, mobility impairments, blind or visual impairments, and those who are deaf or hard of hearing are blessed with the gifts and graces that God gives to all of God's children. Q: How has Dalay's stay with us this summer impacted St. Luke's?

A: "I am just a pumpkin head, a nobody from a poor country, far away. But you have accepted me, and shared your life with me. For • the first time in my life, I have learned what it means to share life here in Highlands Ranch, Colorado, with you," Dalay said to us on a

Sunday morning, as we all wept. It has already been 4 months since Dalay, our remarkable young woman missionary-in-residence returned to Cambodia. During her stay, she shared life with us in so many ways: she taught Sunday School children, spent time with our youth, taught the Cambodia mission team Khmei language and culture, preached from the pulpit, camped and wore shorts and a bathing suit for the first time in her life at Family Camp at Grand Lake, brought us together in collaborative work and friendship with the Cambodian local church, hosted our Taste of Cambodia silent auction, lived with 5 different families, and touched us deeply, as she helped us prepare for our mission trip to Cambodia in January (13-27, 2001). It doesn't seem possible, but in only one month, the Cambodia Mission Team will be met by Dalay in Siem Riep, Cambodia. Our "Mission Possible" will be to begin to build a community center to serve as a place for primary education, vocational training, Bible school, rural clinic, dormitory housing, and source of fresh water and food production for the whole community of Siem Riep. We, too, learned what it is to share life through our time with Dalay. We see this in the passion with which so many here at St. Luke's have made a commitment to mission—that is, ways we stretch ourselves and our lives beyond our comfort zones, beyond our established assumptions and boundaries that we might stand with more of the family of God, as brothers and sisters. We hope and pray that our trip to Cambodia will be such a mission.

Though the Cambodia Mission Team is composed of only twenty some members, you, St. Luke's, have made this possible. You will be there with us in spirit. We have in our plans many ways of keeping connected with our church family here while we are away in Cambodia. We are planning on sharing with you video footage of Christmas in Cambodia before you see us off. We hope to have footage of the church in Siem Riep, the land we are to build on, and Dalay herself for our Christmas Eve morning services (8:00, 9:30, and 11:00) that we might celebrate Christmas with some of our brothers and sisters around the world, and so that you will have a visual of where we will be building/living! We are also planning to send updates, visual and written, on the web while we are away, as well as pseudo-live video footage on the last Sunday of January, that we may, in part, worship with you here. Since both Dick and I will be going on this mission trip, as well as other staff, we will need YOU to take your place as ministers to one another. We have invited thousands of our neighbors to our Christmas Eve services this year, and will really need your help in making our returning guests feel welcome and invited back, particularly in the month of January when some of us will be gone. We will need volunteers for the Sunday afternoon "mugging ministry", among many other things. We need your help! Please contact Tammy Bell and the Ministries Development Team to see what kind of ministry you might like to engage. I know that St. Luke's will be in good hands!! We ask for your prayers!




Taste of St. Luke's! Nov. 12th: A delicious time thanks to all involved!
