



On Sunday. March 19 at



Mark received his Bachelor of Arts in Music from Yale and his Master of Music in Organ Performance from Juilliard.

Mark's compositions are sung throughout the United Methodist Church and other denominations and his choral anthems are best sellers for Abingdon Press and Choristers Guild. His works can also be found

As I enter my own 40th year, I must know by now that anytime I set out to teach our young people, in fact it will be ME who will be taught the most valuable lessons.

On Friday, February 4th, I had the great joy in spending a few hours at the SLY, Jr. Lock-in. Our 5th and 6th graders are smart, witty, talented, engaged, and HIGH-ENERGY. It was a blast and I am so grateful for the time I got to spend with our

young people, as well as the parents who volunteered their time, plus our incredible staff and the adult volunteers who made the Lock-in such a success (and who are SO good at karaoke)!

As I engaged the 21 5th and 6th graders who were there that night, I began with sharing that the St. Luke's congregation was celebrating their 40th Birthday this year and so was I! St. Luke's was chartered on March 13, 1983 and I was born on

December 14, 1983. I asked the group to imagine what their lives would be like in 40 years. Their responses were that they would be 51 or 52 years old. They would be marine biologists, veterinarians.

52 years old. They would be marine biologists, veterinarians, doctors, and parents. They would live in their dream homes and some would be living in Texas or in the mountains.

One young person raised their hand and said, "I know where we will all be in 40 years! We will all be right here, celebrating St. Luke's 80th Anniversary!"

Did my jaw drop? Did my heart

grow two sizes? Did tears spring to my eyes? Yes, yes, and yes.

What a beautiful testimony to the foundation of faith that St. Luke's is forming in the lives of our youth people!!

In the last four decades, I have experienced the normal hallmarks of a healthy spiritual journey. I have loved the church and felt its support and nurturing love through Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, summer camp, confirmation, Youth Sundays, and more. I have also experienced times of feeling frustrated, bored, confused, and even hurt by the church and certain policies and traditions. Yet, I have returned again and again to participate in the life of the church as a college student, as a newlywed, as a transplant in a new city, and eventually (as you are well aware!) accepting a call to ordained ministry. This call will be celebrated this summer as I have been officially recommended for ordination by the Board of Ordained Ministry. Pending clergy session vote, I will be ordained on Sunday, June 25th at 9am at First UMC in Colorado Springs!

My life of faith has been a wild journey these past 40 years and I wish the same for all our young people. There will be times of challenge and growth in their faith. There will be times of deep reflection and soul-filled discernment. There will be times they feel close to the church and times they feel far away.

My hope and prayer is that in 40 years, St. Luke's has remained a warm and welcoming spiritual home for all people by adapting to the current needs of our community. At the 80th Anniversary of St. Luke's UMC in 2063, I hope there are young people present who are asked to dream about the future and see themselves as active participants in the life of a vibrant church community for the 40 years to come! I am so proud to serve a church that is using its 40th Anniversary to propel us forward toward a bright future!

continued from page 1 We were fortunate to have Rev. Dr. Cathie Kelsey, representing the District Superintendent, as our presider for the conference. She is the Interim Dean of the Faculty at the Iliff School of Theology and an Ordained Elder in the Mountain Sky Conference. She immediately

connected with all of us, setting a tone of respect and empathy for viewpoints and ideas shared.

Thanks in part to her encouraging words of support, this Charge Conference felt different from most I have attended. Others in attendance agreed. There was a strong sense of community and spirit and hope among us and we felt optimistic about what was ahead for St.



Luke's. The energy and faith of the participants was a true blessing.

Dr. Kelsey acknowledged that our church was alive, not only in the sanctuary but out in the world. Noting that our attendance numbers are remarkably high on Christmas Eve and Cantata Sunday, compared with Easter Sunday, she encouraged us to think critically about what that means for St. Luke's. Dr. Kelsey suggested one meaning could be that our community connects more to the image of the incarnate Christ, Emmanuel, "God with us" and to a lesser extent the image of Christ suffering on the cross. Her comments sparked great conversation and gave us much to consider.

Throughout the afternoon as we focused on Sacred Business, it was apparent that St. Luke's had much to celebrate from the past year. Through giving examples of what has happened this year because of St. Luke's, we were able to highlight faithful ministry and how that had changed lives in our church and our community. Those present shared the work of Missions, Community Raisers, the Center for Spiritual Engagement, Music and Arts, and the faithful stewardship of St. Luke's members as affirmation of our

Searching for Sabbath: The Holy Work of Rest

It was an honor to spend two consecutive Sundays in February preaching on the Sabbath. I shared that my intention was to turn



everything you thought you knew about Sabbath rest upside down! I hope I succeeded.

The topic of Sabbath is interesting, complex, and nuanced. There are historical, spiritual, and

societal implications in the notions of working and resting. I think we just scratched the surface of this topic!

If you hold onto just a few thoughts from these sermons, my hope is that you remember:

- On the 7th day of creation God rested. If God, the creator of the universe can rest, so can we.
- We deserve to just be we do not always have to be doing, creating, producing to be valuable and worthy. God calls us valuable and worthy regardless of our work.
- There will always be more to do. The work is never done and society will consistently demand more and more from us.We must be the ones to make time to stop and rest.
- Rest is resistance. When we rest, we say no to cultures that are demanding more and more from us. We say no to systems that only see us as producers. This is powerful and empowering.
- Sabbath was meant to be communal. When one person stopped, every one in their household stopped. This is no longer the case, but when we pause to ask ourselves, "Who must continue to labor so that I might have rest?" we create space for us to show up in the world with renewed eyes of compassion and care for each and every member of our society.
- Sabbath rest results in a renewed perspective of all of creation and the entirety of the Kingdom of God.

General Conference Update



On February 5, we had a small gathering of folks interested in what's been going on with the UMC General Conference and the headlines about churches disaffiliating.

Monty Hoffman provided a great overview of the history of the United Methodist Church, so that we had some context for thinking about the current issue with a Wesleyan mindset. John Wesley was of the opinion that his beliefs did not need to be in line with the beliefs of those in his community. The

community, and the fellowship was more important. Wesley, in his sermon on the catholic spirit, said "Is your heart right as my heart is with your heart?...Let all opinions alone on one side and the other: only, 'give me your hand.'" Essentially, I will be in community with you, even if we agree to disagree.

Susan McIntosh gave a summary of the issue at hand, which is essentially that some congregations and pastors want to leave the United Methodist Church because they do not agree that the LGBTQ+ community should be granted the love and grace of fellowship. In 2019, there was a special session of the UMC General Conference (the governing body of the church), which narrowly passed a plan retaining hurtful and discriminatory language in the Social Principles, and increasing punishment for pastors who performed gay and lesbian marriages. It was expected that additional legislation would be presented at the 2020 General Conference to resolve the issue, but the 2020 Conference has been delayed until May of 2024. In the meantime, many churches are choosing to leave the denomination, and many of those are opting to join the newly formed Global Methodist Church (who are opposed to marriage and ordination of people in the LGBTQ+ community). The process of disaffiliation has been divisive, not just in churches leaving the UMC,

Going Above and Beyond With St. Luke's Missions!

St. Luke's long, rich history of serving the community goes well beyond the church walls. This legacy continues today in so many ways. Here's a look at some of the work in which St. Luke's volunteers have been involved during the winter months, as well as a look ahead to the important work planned over the next few months.

Caring for our brothers and sisters, near and far:

Two of our many ongoing projects include the **Blue Bin** to help Veterans who are in transition housing, and **Monday Lunches** which provides 80 lunches weekly to Denver's Safe Outdoor Spaces. Please remember these projects when you go to the grocery store—pick up some canned or shelf-stable goods and drop them in the Blue Bin outside St. Luke's front door. Or pick up some peanut butter and set it in the Mission closet for Monday Lunches!

Two of our annual Christmas projects are **Christmas in the Park** and the **Giving Tree. Christmas in the Park** is held every Christmas Day in downtown Denver. Thank you to our partnership with AFTERHOURS Denver and the 15+ volunteers from St. Luke's. Christmas in The Park 2022

served more than 360 individuals and had more than 270 community volunteers to distribute hats, gloves, sleeping bags, coats, hand warmers, socks and warm clothing. Your generous donations of IKEA shopping bags to every individual in line and warm sweat pants and tops warmed the hearts of many! **The Giving Tree** is another long-time St. Luke's Holiday tradition.



We partnered with Integrated Family Community Services and its annual drive to collect gifts for income qualified children aged newborn to ten years old in South Metro Denver. Passion for the Passion Chorale!

As we embark on the Lenten Journey of self-reflection and relationships, we are singing a new text to a familiar melody for our Prayer Response: "We Hear the Cries of Millions".

This hymn text was written by Jann Aldregde-Clanton, inspired by the books of Micah and Amos (clearly in line with St. Luke's message)!

The familiar melody we use is more often associated with the Lenten lyrics: "O Sacred Head, Now Wounded".

The history of this tune is fascinating: beginning as a rather despondent love song (by Hans Leo Hassler 1601) later paired with the religious text: "O Bleeding Head and Wounded" (by



Paul Gerhardt in 1656, which was a translation of St. Bernard of Clairvaux's original sacred text).

The "Passion Chorale" tune that appears in hymnals today, was harmonized and arranged by Johann Sebastian Bach (we celebrate his 338th birthday this March).

Bach was so moved by this tune, he incorporated it five times in his monumental St. Matthew Passion. Scholars have debated the significance of "five times".....perhaps representing the five wounds of Jesus (albeit, the only Gospel to reference the "Lance of Longinus" and wounding Jesus' side, is St John's Passion account). Personally, I think Bach may have considered the "Crown of Thorns" as the fifth wound.

Whatever the case, the Passion Chorale Tune has inspired singers, composers, and congregants for centuries. As we sing this solemn and moving melody this Lent, may it bring a sense of connection to our rich religious heritage, offer solace and inspiration as we Give Thanks and Praise to our Creator. *Blessings, Ken Mervine*





continued from page 5 but within congregations and communities as well. Additionally, hateful rumors and disinformation about the process has been widespread.

Michele reiterated that St. Luke's will remain a United Methodist congregation and we will continue to be a church that values the wide spectrum of people that come together to be in community with each other. Rev. Michele asked those gathered to think about two continuums and where we considered ourselves to be. Are we "traditional" in our thinking (opposed to gay marriage and ordination), or are we progressive? Also, do we feel that we are compatible with worshiping with others, even if they don't believe the same thing, or is that incompatible with your beliefs? Throughout the history of St. Luke's, our tendency has been more moderate on the whole, with a small number of folks on the far ends of both spectrums. More than 80% of our community (and United Methodists as a whole), believe that, no matter where we fall on the Traditional-Progressive continuum, we can still be compatible with one another, and worship together.

Rev. Liza helped us look to the future, envisioning what the church should be as we continue on our spiritual journeys in the 21st century. She noted that there is a lot of opportunity to build communities of faith and support. The church may look very different in 2050 than it did in 1950, or even 2023, but the reason for the church will remain - to do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with God. -Susan McIntosh

Our students and staff continue to thrive at St. Luke's. We are looking forward to our upcoming Art Show which will be available for church members to see in April! Grace & Love, Kelly



More from Les: My Hiding Place

Les Ludlam Retired Clergy When I was 6, I had a "hiding place" near our farm house.

It was a place where I could go to be all by myself.

I kept my collection of rocks there; my favorite toy airplane was there.

Lots of the things that were very special to me at that time of my life were kept safely tucked away in my special hiding place.

It was in the branches of a big old Elm tree not far from our house. I could go there, climb up and look across the yard toward the barn and the fields beyond, I felt like I could see the whole world from there.

Then one day, my father told my mother that the Elm must be cut down. Insects had killed the tree and it was in danger of falling into the power lines that brought electricity to our farmhouse. I really felt bad.

When my parents told me to bring my treasures back to the house, I knew the end was coming. I cried.

About a week later, early in the morning, I heard loud noises. I looked outside and saw my father and my grandfather cutting down the tree!

First, they cut the base with a saw, then they looped a long logging chain around the trunk and hooked it to the back of the tractor. Then, father climbed aboard the tractor, put it in gear and began to pull forward. Slowly the old tree swayed and then with a loud "Crack!" it began to topple. It hit the ground with a crash and a cloud of dust. My hiding place was gone. I couldn't climb up to see the fields beyond our farm. I didn't have a place to go to be alone. I cried, again.

I decided to find a new hiding place. I put a supply of roasted peanuts, my favorite food even today, and all my important things, including an extra pair of socks, into a small sack. (My mom had told me to never wear wet socks because it could put blisters on my feet.)

Then I started walking toward the woods down by the river, looking for a new hiding place.

When I didn't appear for the midday meal, my parents began to worry. They started looking for me and almost fearfully began to look down toward the river.

They found, and followed, a trail of peanut hulls, and shortly, they found me sitting next to a huge cottonwood tree near the riverbank. They weren't too happy with me but for some reason they just took me home and didn't say much.

For several weeks after that, I moped around the house. Nothing satisfied me, I was ill-mannered at the table, I kept forgetting things, I tormented my little brother even more than usual! I was, in a word, a six-year-old mess.

One afternoon, mother took me out to the barn. We climbed the steps up to the loft and she took me to a corner that had been cleared of hay. It was next to a window that looked out to the west. "You can use this if you like," she said.

Well, I wasn't sure; it smelled like a barn! Well... it was a barn! And it was dusty, but I decided to try. At least it was a place where I could be alone!

I took my rocks and toy airplane and other stuff up there and after a while I got to liking it. Better yet, our dog could climb up there with me! She couldn't have done that in the elm tree.

A few months later, mother told me that the dog was going to have puppies. She said it might be nice if I used my special place as a nursery when the puppies were born. So, we built a box for her, and sure enough when her puppies were born, she stayed in it!

I would go out to my new hiding place in the barn and just sit, watching the dog take care of her puppies. My new special hiding place had become even more special!

Our hiding places are not just for escaping but for dealing with living. It is not so much about where they are or what they look like, as it is about what happens to refresh and renew us when we go there. So, find your hiding place and use it.
